Session Title	A Simulation-based Intelligent Tutoring System for WMD emergency medical services incident management

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**Section 2. Workshop Summary** – Summarizes the workshop session including: topic, objective, format, and training method. Should not be more than two paragraphs.

The purpose of these workshop was to provide an introduction to simulation-based intelligent tutoring systems. We presented and demonstrated a training system developed during an ongoing Phase I Small Business Innovation Research project that places the student in the role of a medical branch director responding to a chlorine explosion at a water plant. Before the simulation, the student receives a briefing that describes the student's role, the recent events of the incident that have occurred so far, and background information about the weather, geography, medical and emergency response resources of the city, county, and neighboring counties. During the simulation, the student listens to simulated radio traffic from the dispatch, EMS units, incident commander, and other simulated characters. The student can "speak" over the radio by selecting choices from a hierarchically-organized menu. The student can also refer to a map of the city and reference materials to help them assess the constantly evolving situation accurately. After the simulation, the software presents an automatically-constructed debriefing, or after-action review, that describes each correct and incorrect action taken by the student and the reason why the action was correct or incorrect. At the end of the presentation, we distributed a questionnaire to elicit feedback on the system. We also presented background information about intelligent tutoring systems and related systems that teach military command, control, and tactical decision-making.

The training software combines two training methods: Scenario-based training simulations and intelligent tutoring systems. Scenario-based simulations challenge students to assess situations, make decisions, and experience the effects of their actions in realistically-complex situations. Intelligent tutoring systems emulate expert instructors by monitoring and automatically evaluating student performance during simulations to provide detailed, instructional feedback. Advantages of these approaches include realism of the training experiences, and automated evaluation of student performance. Disadvantages include the complexity of developing these systems. The challenge is to develop scenario development tools, methods and templates that can simplify the development of these systems while retaining the sophistication needed to achieve training realism and effectiveness.
