This Conference provides an opportunity for participants to learn about the following:

Goods Movement - new initiatives to reduce the impacts of transporting goods or produce.

Sustainability/Green Jobs - sustainability in the context of jobs aimed at preserving ecosystems and reducing consumption.

Ambient Air/Climate Change - impacts of ambient air pollutants and greenhouse gases on disproportionately affected communities.

- On April 22, 2008, EPA published a final rule under the authority of § 402(c)(3) of the Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA) to address lead-based paint hazards created by renovation, repair, and painting activities that disturb lead-based paint in “target housing” and “child-occupied facilities.” *September
- **Applicability:** Covers renovation, repair and painting activities that disturb painted surfaces in target housing and child occupied facilities. Excludes:
 - Renovation of components with no lead-based paint
 - Minor repair and maintenance
 - Renovations performed by homeowners in their own homes
- Opt-out provision: -- Homeowners may opt out if they occupy the home to be renovated, the home is not a COF, and no child under age 6 or pregnant woman lives there.
- This program applies only in States and Tribes that have not received authorization by EPA to administer their own program.

- **Certification of Individuals**
- Must take 8-hour accredited training course:
 - Certified Renovators - perform & direct renovation activities
 - Dust sampling technicians - perform dust sampling *not for an* abatement
- Course certificate serves as certification (no application to EPA required)
- Refresher training is required every 5 years
- Other workers do not need certification
- Certification allows the renovator to perform renovations in any non-authorized state or Indian tribal area
