Partnership

- NYC Transit Authority
 - Busiest and largest transit system in the U.S.
 - 8 million rides daily
- NYCOSH been in partnership for nearly 30 years
 - Hazardous Waste Worker Training Program
 - RCRA & SARA Title III
- Currently provide upwards of 30 trainings per year



Challenges

- Giant agency with frequent turnover
 - Unclear who is point of contact
 - Lack of communication between internal staff
- Lack of resources
 - Disorganization
 - Small class sizes
 - Delayed tech advancements
 - Difficulty with reporting requirements



Strategies for co-existing

"Overcoming" challenges is a lofty goal. Let's focus on moving towards a common goal.

- 1. Set ground rules
 - Discuss your expectations for the partnership regularly
 - Develop a written rulebook
- 2. Keep communication flowing regularly
 - Don't be strangers
- 3. Know your point people
 - Designate one "go-to" person
 - Confirm you've got the right person
 - Don't make assumptions people talk to each other in your partner's agency
- 4. Get and give feedback regularly
- 5. Be flexible
