The Carolina Lupus Study is officially under way, and we have had a very successful first few months in the field. Here is a summary of our experience to date.

CLU Study Progress

Our process involves four main steps: we **receive referrals** of patients from CLU physicians, we **contact** the patients to determine if they are eligible, we **enroll** interested patients into the study, and we **complete** an interview and get a blood sample from patients who agree to participate. In our first 6 months, we have:

Received	112	referrals
Contacted	94	
Enrolled	89	
Completed	82	interviews

Few patients have declined to participate, and 91% have agreed to provide a blood sample. The interest and cooperation we have received reflects the dedication of the lupus patients and their interest in contributing to research about this disease.

We have also enrolled 41 representatives of the general population ("controls"). Only 17% of the controls we have contacted have declined to participate, which is a very good indication of the willingness of the people of North Carolina and South Carolina to give of their time to help others.

Our interviewers, **Alesia Sanyika** and **Sara Graham** have logged more than 11,000 miles in their travels in the eastern Carolinas.

Who are the CLU Participants?

Lupus most often affects young women, and this is shown by the make-up of our study participants. Of the patients referred to our study, 93% are female. The average age at diagnosis is 30 years, but ranges from 18 to 81. Most CLU participants were born in North Carolina or South Carolina, but others are from many different parts of the world (including South America, Europe, and Asia). More than half (53%) of CLU patients are African Americans.

What Have We Learned?

We have not undertaken any formal data analysis since it is important to wait until we have enough cases and controls to make valid comparisons. But one very important aspect of what we have learned comes from the participants' comments at the end of the interview. Patients have expressed their worries about the health of family members, stresses in their lives, and concerns about working conditions. These are all issues that we will be able to examine in the Carolina Lupus Study.
