 - Tom Sheahan: work from Northeastern's Training Core about Citizen Scientists
 - Action Item: Danielle to look into survey of trainees
 - Jay Goodman Training Core Leader, MSU: Convergence, the 3rd revolution in the biological sciences: applying this to training in toxicology
 - Alberts et al paper: Rescuing US biomedical research from its systemic flaws (PNAS, April 22, 2014, vol. 111, no. 16, 5773–5777)
 - Discussion:
 - Hennig – the SRP is lightyears ahead. Broadening the career path for young scientists section explains some of the things that SRP is already doing.
 - CareerTrac and similar databases will give us the information we need to see future directions (where trainees are going).
 - Tukey – Agrees with Bernie from the trainee perspective. Expertise in the funding program and the review programs are lacking in the areas of science that SRP programs are involved in. NIEHS should put more effort to get expert reviewers on the panels that review SRP grants. The programs are being hurt because of it.
 - Raina agrees with Bob. Reviewers are often younger and don't understand the effort that it takes to put together an SRP. Require reviewers to review the overview and perhaps give a score for it. It would help the projects they are reviewing in a better context.
 - Tukey - Need to get expert reviewers. Sat on a panel recently and was shocked at what the reviewers didn't know.
 - Raina – at NSF grantees can suggest reviewers.
 - Danielle – will gladly take names of people the programs recommend.

- Danielle – suggested conducting a mock review for the trainees and seeing the reviews done on YouTube.
 - Craig Marcus – does mock reviews for OSU’s Training Core
 - Ericka Fritsch – liked the article and thought it was helpful in trying to decide what direction your career path is going.
 - The paper has triggered discussion among trainees. The fact that trainees are interested and involved in policy development shows that the SRP is headed in the right direction.
