
NIEHS Environmental Career Worker Training Program (ECWTP)

- More than 27 years of success in training and empowering un/underemployed individuals to obtain sustainable careers
- Delivers job/technical and life skills training, wrap-around social services, and education
- Produces individual, workplace, community, and socio-economic policy benefits to advance environmental justice and health equity in underserved and disadvantaged communities




WTP 27 Years of the <u>Environmental Career Worker Training Program</u> (ECWTP) in 2022: Creating Job Opportunities & Changing Lives

- Success: Since beginning of program, approx. 14,023 workers have been trained with an average 70% employment rate.
- Locations: Over 30 communities trained with 200 different CBOs
- Current Programs: Six grantees working with 25 different CBO's
- 2022: 512 individuals trained with 366 employed at a 71 % job placement rate. (As of 10/22)
- 2021: 491 individuals trained with 305 employed at a 62% job placement rate.
 *Note The COVID-19 pandemic impacted training.
- Designated an HHS Justice40 Pilot by White House
- Takeaways: Changing Lives & Building Careers for a Lifetime
- Training Best Practices: Extensive life skills, mentoring, numerous training and certificates and career options for graduates
- Economic Impact Return of Investment: \$100 million return on \$3.5 million investment-<u>https://www.niehs.nih.gov/careers/hazmat/wtp_ecwtp_report_508.pdf</u>

ECWTP & Justice40 Initiative

- Justice40 Initiative aims to deliver 40% of the overall benefits from federal investments to disadvantaged communities
- ECWTP is 1 of 13 programs selected for HHS
- Why was ECWTP selected as a pilot?
 - Success in workforce development and helping un/under-employed individuals obtain sustainable, life changing careers
 - Strong track record of helping disadvantaged communities respond to and recover from climate disasters and health emergencies
 - Economic benefits: \$1.79 billion return on investment (total) from 1995 to 2013



Justice40 aims to address climate change, clean energy, clean transportation, affordable housing, water infrastructure, workforce development, and pollution remediation



New Parameters as Justice40 Pilot

- Expand recruitment and training to additional communities
- Added new training sites such as Puerto Rico and St. Louis
- Added new courses for community health worker program in New York
- New training courses and certifications to explore new job opportunities for trainees.
- Bringing in new training partners to other disadvantaged communities.
- Focus on benefits to communities and trainees in your reports
- Share video's or success stories in your RPPR and any news articles or video clips as they occur.
- Ideas for new stakeholder engagement opportunities.

ECWTP Addresses Climate Change and Public Health Emergencies

- Provides the skills, knowledge, and resources to prepare for and respond to the impacts of climate-related disasters and public health emergencies
- Enables community members to get involved in creating healthy, sustainable models to protect their environment and revitalize their communities
- Response to several climate-related disasters and health emergencies, including:
 - Hurricanes (Sandy, Katrina) and flooding
 - Deepwater Horizon Gulf Oil Spill
 - Flint water crisis
 - COVID-19




Update the EIR

Major Findings of the ECWTP Economic Impact Report

Economic Impact: \$100 million return on \$3.5 million investment


- Increased probability of employment by 59%
- \$1.6M in higher earnings for graduates (from increased likelihood of employment, more hours worked, and higher wages)
- \$1.79 billion (total value added)
- \$717 million reduction in government expenditures

A 2019 financial survey of graduates conducted by the NJ/NY Hazardous Materials Training Center, showed:






