- Mission:
 - o https://agentsofchangeinej.org/
 - Agents of Change in Environmental Justice is a fellowship program aimed at empowering environmental health leaders who come from historically underrepresented backgrounds in science and academia.
 - Assist doctoral students, postdocs, and early-career scientists with the tools to share their research through different multi-media and deliverables.
- Overview:
 - 31 total fellows across 3 cohorts.
 - 9-month fellowship
 - Co-led by Ami Zota (George Washington University SPH) and Brian Mailman
 (Environmental Health News)—a joint venture between the two institutions.
 - Columbia's Mailman School of Public Health will replace Milken come June 2022.
- Fellowship requirements:
 - Write a first-person narrative essay,
 - o Participate in the Agents of Change podcast, and attend monthly virtual meetings,
 - Produce an episode of the Agents of Change podcast in collaboration with another fellow,
 - Develop a science translation product focused on educating community groups or policymakers on a particular issue, in collaboration with other fellows.
- Fellowship eligibility:
 - Pursuing scientific work that advances environmental public health, environmental justice, or ecosystem/climate health and justice.
 - Early career scientist is defined as a current doctoral student, medical student, or postdoctoral scientist, or an early career practitioner defined as someone working in advocacy, government, research, or private sector for < 5 years since terminal degree.
 - From marginalized backgrounds and/or populations underrepresented in science and academia.
 - Based in the United States; applicants do not need to be US citizens.

Questions:

1. Does a prospective applicant have to have a U.S. green card to apply?

- As long as an applicant is affiliated with a U.S. institution, they are eligible and encouraged to apply.
- 2. How can SRP Centers give their own trainees experiences and opportunities related to environmental justice?
 - SRP Centers may consider integrating training opportunities outside of the traditional research project—for example, offering externships with NGO partners—or bringing trainees into SRP research communities and interfacing with the public. SRP Centers may also benefit from engaging with research projects outside of their institutions to support smaller, less-resourced groups. Jamaji shared his experience partnering with ISES and ISEE to organize the Vibrations: African Environment Photo Essay Contest (https://www.elnd.org/projects).
- 3. How did you develop your skills and comfortability with research translation and of those lessons, what can be shared with SRP trainees?

 Integrating opportunities to go out and engage with communities through the Community Engagement or Research Translation cores to answer the question in 5 minutes of, "Why should my grandma care about this?" Agents of Change also emphasizes a peer support model whereby fellows independently correspond to refine and reflect on one another's work.
- 4. Could you provide clarification on whether an early career scientist can apply to this amazing program?
 Early career scientist working in government and nonprofits with a terminal degree received <5 years are eligible to apply.</p>
